The federal Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA) requires that local zoning and other land use regulations avoid discriminating against, or imposing substantial burdens on, religious land uses, such as churches and religious schools.

RLUIPA prohibits the implementation of any land use regulation that imposes a "substantial burden" on the religious exercise of a person or religious assembly or institution except where justified by a "compelling governmental interest" that the government pursues in the least restrictive way possible.

The Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act, commonly known by its acronym RLUIPA, is a federal law requiring local governments, when implementing and enforcing land use regulations, to do so without burdening the exercise of religion by religious institutions and to treat them in the same manner as nonreligious institutions.

Now, RLUIPA requires local land use de- cisions that burden religious exercise to satisfy the demanding "strict scrutiny" standard of review in order to be upheld. In the thirteen years that RLUIPA has been in effect, federal courts have come to a general consensus that the Act is constitutional.
